The ERG

The European Regulators Group was set up by Commission Decision 2002/627/EC (as amended by 2004/641/EC)

The ERG is composed of National Regulatory Authorities (NRAs) from 34 European Countries:

- 27 EU Member States;
- 4 EFTA Members (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, Switzerland), with “observer” status;
- 3 EU Candidate countries (Croatia, FYROM, Turkey) with “observer” status.

The European Commission attends all ERG meetings and can participate in the activities of ERG expert groups.

ERG's objectives, pursuant to Article 3 of the ERG Decision, are:

- **to advise and assist the Commission in developing the Internal Market;**
- **to ensure the consistent application of the European regulatory framework.**
- **Furthermore, the ERG enables NRAs to share their experiences of implementing the framework and of responding to market and technological developments.**
- **ERG activities are based on a Work Programme prepared for each calendar year.**
- **ERG products are delivered in several formats (Common Positions, Opinions, Reports...)**

Policy of transparency and engagement

The ERG seeks to ensure maximum transparency and consultation with stakeholders:

- consultations on the proposed Work Programme and on all draft decisions
- public hearings on major topics
- publication of all decisions and outcomes of consultations (subject to confidentiality requests by stakeholders)
- information provided promptly by the Chair to stakeholders about initiatives taken (Plenary debriefing, press releases and periodic meetings with stakeholders)
- participation in all major European and International Conferences
- Annual Report of activities submitted to the European Commission (and



ERG 2007 Work Programme

Focussed on three priority areas, aimed at meeting ERG objectives:

1. Regulation: to be at the forefront of the evolution of the regulatory framework;
2. Harmonisation: to boost regulatory harmonisation among ERG members and effectively contribute to the development of the internal market;
3. Innovation: to respond to and anticipate new issues driven by technological development.
